<b>Goals and objectives of the course</b>	Economic Security provides students an in-depth understanding of the policy implemented by the governments to protect the domestic market, population, producers and provide equal opportunity to all participants for safe and prosperous life conditions.
<b>Description of the course</b>	Economic Security distinguishing features are its multi-disciplinary focus on economics and security, where taken three dimensions of analysis: state, entity and citizen. Students apply their knowledge of institutions, policies, and market dynamics to issues in international markets, global economic governance, economic security, economic development, and international business.
